## **CHELLE MCINTYRE**

## **Member Profile**

#### How long have you been involved in the Arts?

Really I've been in amongst creative groups for most of my adult life - out of school I was heavily into the independent music scene - punk rock and new wave, which while appearing very chaotic and even ugly to outsiders was actually brimming with dedicated talented artistic people. I hung out with a artist run initiative called One Flat which did many interesting weird projects, I played drums in bands, saw too many to even remember, and wrote about that scene in my fanzine Ratsack. Outside of my Public Service job, there was always something creative going on like that was normal life. Then I travelled a lot for a couple of years at a time, had a family, and it wasn't until moving to Toowoomba in my late thirties with my two school-age daughters that I felt I had the freedom to really pursue something more independent Artistically that didn't require a group context. I started a Diploma in Fine Arts at Southern Qld Institute of TAFE in 2004, really because I needed to meet people here (outside of school tuckshop) and I knew I wanted to find the arty folk - primarily I wanted to gain skills and knowledge about art practice that I hadn't previously had full access to.

#### What medium do you prefer?

My focus for the last four years has been assemblage using drop-sawn recycled tongue and groove wallboards. I prefer limited palette and abstracted line over organic form, and this material suits that even though I could never have imagined I'd be using wood as a preferred material. Really it is an extension of a long-running fascination with collage and recycling materials into something different – I've done this playfully since I was a child. I truly enjoy moving paint on a surface and remember this whenever I do it. I haven't had much of a chance of late because I get obsessed over the wood collage and utilising the skills I've acquired since I started doing it in 2006.

### What are the most important influences that have moved you as an artist?

I am always most influenced by my physical place and how that environment affects me. Coming to Toowoomba I found that water issues were foremost a challenge: Brisbane is so close but being on the river and near the coast made it a very different atmosphere to the dry environment I encountered here. I recall getting totally spun out by a crack in the earth that appeared in my backyard here during a very dry period – it was nearly two metres long, six centimetres wide and quite deep. More so now I feel I am defined by my house here, a huge old Queenslander which has been in my family for over one hundred years - it is really what ties me to my art practise: the concept of house as self. I struggled with moving to Toowoomba because while the space



from history was something I needed, I am a city girl attached to the subculture and community of big populations to create with ease. The house holds me here and sometimes I feel it is a cop-out because the city is perhaps where I'd rather be. By the same token I do reflect that the move here has been one of the smartest albeit most difficult things I've done.

### Who are your favourite artists; acclaimed or emerging?

l've been into Andy Warhol forever mainly from my musical youth early on encountering the Velvet Underground – the band and the whole Factory scene – a group creating a dynamic art/music revolution situation.

Marcel Duchamp's 'Nude Descending a Staircase' has stuck with me from the time I started high school and doing art, using Betty Churches' 'Understanding Art' textbook which I still own from that time. When I was doing my Diploma and had to seek out references for influences I looked more into these and others and understood then that readymade and abstract line was something I was attracted to on a deeper level than I'd previously realised. Picasso is another influence, for his fractured and restructured cubist works.

Once I'd started working with the wallboards, people started referring me to Australian artist Rosalie Gascoigne with whom I now feel a great affiliation especially with regard to her displacement issue – from New Zealand to Mt Stromlo.

Former Brisbane now New York based artist Anthony Lister is also a favourite – I've always been into cartoons and comics. I like street art and subscribe to 'Juxtapoz', an Art & Culture Magazine, and through the internet source further information on many of the artists it highlights.

### Q. What exhibit have you seen within the last year that has most influenced you? Why?

I go to loads of local art openings mainly to mix and talk with like minds and keep up with what's happening and who's doing what. My main influence comes from people doing things more than what they actually do – I'm inspired by action. Through Juxtapoz I've found artists like Sarah Frost – I like recycled materials a lot because I think there is too much crap in the world already. I try to catch a few GOMA shows and the Asia Pacific Triennial when it comes around.

#### Q. Do you think that living in Toowoomba is an asset or hindrance for developing an art practice regarding its regional states?

For me it's been a huge asset because I think I may just have been too caught up functioning in a city to do anything if I was elsewhere. Plus I have the luxury of space to work and time to study and maintain practise here and it's comfortable to raise my kids in this community. I've had three solo exhibitions in four years and I'm not sure that in a large population like the city of Brisbane that this would have been possible without more financial backing or a hugely competitive edge. It's enabled me to hone my skills while exhibiting to get to the position where I feel I can take it elsewhere with confidence in my ability.

### Q. Do you have any upcoming projects you can tell us about?

This year I really want to make some significant works to exhibit in shows and competitions. I've entered ok works in competitions like the Stanthorpe and Churchie Art prize a couple of years back and didn't get hung. It did make me realise I needed to do something with toil and professionalism behind it including the photo submissions. With this attitude I purpose-made a large artwork 'Beautiful Rain' that was a finalist in the 2010 Regional Art Awards so I figure that tells me I was perhaps on the right track. It's important now that I get my artworks outside my region and beyond my comfort zone here. I've entered the Churchie this year with three large works and I'd really just like to get in for the exposure.

## Q. Do you think of your art as existing within a moral context, do you think that a moral context is necessary for true creativity?

My art is based in a personal context – what concerns me: currently that's the urban and rural divide, weather and landscapes as an aesthetic abstraction of my emotional response to place. A moral context exists at any time however is subjective to a degree especially towards the middle of extremes of morality codes. It is noticeable as a single parent that

some people find it difficult to look outside of what they personally consider is right, wrong or appropriate – I don't feel a great need to make social comment in my artworks because I don't get too charged about it. I'm not inclined towards absolutism on any level really and believe that every situation has its own unique influences that may or may not draw wide comment.

## Q. What helps create a suitable environment for making art (aside from tools)?

An active environment helps inspire my own – when down or even isolated I find I am inclined to stay in my head rather than produce which is what happened after the January flood when the wet atmosphere made working in the studio unbearable. I gain energy off social contact and like contribution in any form – some like to sit back and suck it up but I like to be in there doing something and being supportive. If you saw my house and studio you'd understand I could operate in almost any environment – I don't care to be too precious because life is and that what matters - not the material.

### **Q.** What question would you like me to ask you?

How are you? I'm fine, really, everything is as it should be...


